A feelings check-in can be done at any time but at the beginning of class each day is a great time to try it. Can be presented in PearDeck or Jamboard to make it interactive.



Write each student's name on a sticky note and copy the jam for each day. Students pull their name to the top if they are present. Those left are absent.



Retrieval practice tells us that a "brain dump," where we recall everything we can about a topic. Provide a space where students can do a brain dump.



This engagement strategy is a multi use check in. You can use it at the beginning of a lesson and then have students move their post it as the lesson closes up.





A quick mid-lesson check can be made more fun with an animated GIF. Students add their name with text or sticky. Or use shapes to be anonymous.




