

3 Ways A Plagiarism Checker Can Help Students

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Can a plagiarism checker actually help students? A plagiarism checker shouldn't be a tool used for punishment. Instead, this type of tool can help student writers as they strengthen their craft and learn how to write better.

How to Check Plagiarism

A plagiarism checker looks at student-submitted work for similarities to other pieces of content. Many similarities in student writing can happen accidentally. For example, students might look for shortcuts when a big deadline is looming or when a confusing assignment might feel intimidating. The consequences of plagiarism can certainly vary at different levels of education. However, understanding how to write, paraphrase, and cite correctly is a skill students can strengthen throughout their time in middle and high school.

Institutions can use a plagiarism checker tool to review work submitted to their platforms. But teachers, and students can also use it to strengthen student writing skills. Let's look at how a plagiarism checker can help students build writing skills – and help their teacher support them along the way.

Fostering writing skills and improving grammar

When students use a plagiarism checker, they look closely at their writing throughout the writing process. This encourages them to pause periodically during a writing assignment to review their work. It also provides tools that can help them strengthen their writing skills. A plagiarism check can help students check grammar before submitting and fix mistakes that appear in their first or second drafts, too.

If students (or teachers) generate a similarity report, they can ask for feedback. Teachers can leave feedback right on a similarity report. This feature lets them connect their feedback to a particular paragraph, sentence, or word. The specific, actionable feedback left by a teacher is a useful addition to the similarity report generated with a tool like [PlagiarismCheck.org](https://www.plagiarismcheck.org).

Helping to cite properly

Learning how to cite a source is a skill students can use across careers and disciplines. Although you might have a specific media literacy curriculum where you discuss citations with students, building it into the context of an assignment is

particularly meaningful. A plagiarism checker can help students identify moments where they need to add or fix a citation. Citing correctly is an important skill, and a simple citation generator can help them in this process.

Educating about avoiding plagiarism

Introducing a plagiarism checker to students can also spark conversations around plagiarism and its consequences inside and outside the classroom.
